# 1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

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## 1.1 INTRODUCTION

### 1.1 INTRODUCTION

Upendra Nath Brahma College, Popularly known as U.N. Brahma College, the leading educational Institution of Lower Assam as well as in the Bodoland Territorial Region was founded in the year 2001 after the name of a visionary Bodo leader and a social worker, “Upendra Nath Brahma” who is also popularly known as “Father of the Bodos”. The college is located of one of the finest location of Kajalgaon, the district headquarter of Chirang district .Since the establishment the College has been effectively nurturing to the need of Higher Education in Chirang and its neighbouring districts. The Govt. of Assam has granted the college a concurrence on 4th of October in the year 2005 and it has secured temporary affiliation from Gauhati University for the three years degree courses (TDC) of Arts stream on 16.01.2007 and also received class opening permission for the commerce stream from the session 2011-12 under the same University. Further the college has received Permanent Affiliation from the session 2012-13. The College has also been recognized by UGC New Delhi, Ministry of HRD under section 2 (f) on 16.12.2009 and 12(B) on 23.06 2015 respectively of the UGC Act, 1956.

At present the College has been moved and affiliated to Bodoland University as per the Govt. order No. AHE.156/2020/19 dtd. 2nd July, 2020. U.G. students both Arts and Commerce are now registered under Bodoland University, Kokrajhar from the session 2020-21.

After 20 (twenty) years of its establishment, the services of the teaching and non teaching staff (Arts stream only) of the college have provincialised in the year 2021 by the Govt. of Assam under the Act of the Assam Education (Provincialisation of services of the Teachers and re-organisation of Educational Institution) Act, 2017 & Amended Act, 2018. Today the college offers 13 undergraduate (UG) programmes including Arts and Commerce. It is a co-educational institution of higher learning and the student strength of the college is 760. The total number of teaching faculty is 36 and nonteaching staff is 16. The College emphasises on the man-making education which will produce morally upright, intellectually competent and spiritually guided future citizens of our great country.

### **Vision**

The college has a clear vision to emerge as a centre of excellence in imparting quality and value-based education to the younger generation by facilitating them to generate employment opportunities in diverse fields and nurturing an honest and responsible citizenry. It is envisioned that the college will be brought to the forefront of Higher Education in Bodoland Territorial Region because of the aspirations, efficiency and leadership of the college administration and the commitment, service and flexibility of the teaching and non teaching staff, support of the parents and the people of the surrounding area and the hard work of the students.

### **Mission**

Our mission is to help students develop the knowledge, skills, and values they need to be successful. Offering Honours Courses in almost all the subjects at the undergraduate level both in Arts and Commerce, Upendra Nath Brahma college is now recognizably a large institution of higher learning. The college emphasizes in imparting quality education to the students to instil them with confidence in order to face the new challenges of the time. The college has a clear mission to make the students socially and morally responsible citizens and prepare them to act as active agents in Nation Building process. The college attempts to make the students understand the value of education in present situation and prepare them physically, socially, morally and educationally fit in every sphere of their future life.

### **Institutional Strength**

- The college has sufficient amount of land (40 Acre) for its future development and to lead the institution up to university level.
- The local community has a well-established link and coordination with the college and they have good faith on the institution.
- The college has started to take bold initiative to digitalize the whole functionary of the college to build the academic environment to feet with the modern age of science and technology.
- The college has been taking part in NIRF, ARIIA and Unnat Bharat Abhiyan regularly.

### **Institutional Weakness**

The college has limited resources in the use of digital technology to enhance teaching- learning on campus. The followings are the weak points of Upendra Nath Brahma College:

- Inadequate numbers of sanctioned faculty members.
- Limited financial resources to meet the expenditure of salary of non-sanctioned and part time teachers.
- Majority of students enrolled belong to poor economic and educational background families.
- Inadequate numbers of smart classrooms.
- No infrastructure for gymnasium.
- Fund crunch hampering the overall growth of institutional development.

### **Institutional Opportunity**

- Provision for construction of multi-storied administrative block and class rooms as per the master plan.
- More career-oriented courses may be introduced from additional funding from UGC/Statutory Bodies.
- Scope for setting up language lab and smart class rooms.
- Opportunity for development of Green Campus.
- Scope for organizing extension programmes in the fringe villages for social benefits.
- Placement of the students in tourism sector as the area is rapidly growing as a tourism destination.
- There is the opportunity to upgrade the certificate courses of the college into skill-oriented diploma courses for better future of the students.
- College has some special advantages of getting autonomous status in the upcoming days.
- College has the opportunity to work more for expanding e-learning.
- College has the opportunity to introduce different skill development courses along with some science and commerce programs.
- There is the opportunity of introducing ideas of Entrepreneurship in students mind for reducing unemployment.
- Availability of a large number of senior secondary schools, that acts as feeder- institutions for the College.

### **Institutional Challenge**

- Improvement of quality performance of the students.
- Poor class attendance of students due to economic hardship of the Guardians.
- Maximum students are coming from remote and flood affected areas.
- No accommodation facilities for the students.
- Developing linkage with skill-based industry is a challenge.
- Poor admission in career-oriented course due to lack of exposure.
- Drive for admission of more meritorious students.
- The surrounding area of the college is affected by heavy flood every year due to which the development of academic environment is hampered.
- Shortage of sufficient fund is another challenge of the college because of which all round development of the college could not be achieved as desired.
- It is a challenge to obtain the Grants and Funding for pursuing research projects and creating Academic Excellencies.
- Limited teaching staff in sanctioned post is another challenge of the college due to which the college couldn't keep pace with the development of global educational atmosphere.
- Lack of sufficient research infrastructure is also a challenge of the college due to which the college could not move forward properly in the sphere of research and development.
- The problem of student's dropout is another major challenge of the college.
- This Problem occurs every year because most of the students of the college are from poor economic background.

## 1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

### Curricular Aspects

U. N. Brahma College is a Degree College and offers Under Graduate level courses in Arts and Commerce streams. At present the College is affiliated to the Bodoland University, Kokrajhar. The college follows the curriculum of its affiliating university. It offers courses at the under graduate level according to the curriculum prescribed by B.U. Choice Based Credit System was introduced from the academic session 2019-2020. Up to the Even Semester of 2019, we followed the Semester System of Gauhati University but from the Odd Semester of the same year we have been following the CBCS introduced by the affiliating universities as well as the UGC. Till 2020 the college was under the affiliation of Gauhati University but in the same year we had to go under the affiliation of Bodoland University and the same started with the B.A and B.Com 1st Semester. So, till the Even Semester of 2022, both Gauhati University and Bodoland University were our affiliating Universities. The university organizes workshops and symposiums inviting teachers and other stakeholders to participate in the process of design or revision of the curricula and syllabi. A Daily Master Class Routine is prepared by the Academic Committee at the beginning of every Semester and all the daily classes are done according to the same routine. Environmental Studies is a compulsory subject for the undergraduates both for the Honours and Regular Courses. The institute has developed the effective mechanism and due process and structure for the implementation of the curriculum. The College and Departmental calendar and lesson plans developed by teachers ensure effective delivery of the programme. An academic calendar is formulated at the start of each academic session for each batch and is circulated amongst students. The College academic calendar outlines the academic and other activities of the college. Internal assessment which includes assignment and tests is the compulsory part of pedagogy organised to monitor the implementation of the course structure

## **Teaching-learning and Evaluation**

Teaching-learning and evaluation is a student-centric dynamic activity. The admission is done strictly on merit basis and according to Reservation Policy for sixth Schedule area of Indian constitution. The college strictly follows the policies and directions issued by the Department of Higher Education, Government of Assam. The process of admission of students into various courses is transparent which involves advertisement through notice in the college website and notice board and roadside banners. Prior to the admission candidates have to register and apply through the admission portal available in the college website for limited time period during the beginning of every session and publication of selection list in the college website as well as in the notice board well ahead of the admission. Orientation programme is organised to inform newly admitted students with Code of Conduct about the curriculum, programme outcome and the minimum facilities available in the institution. The central library conducts orientation programme 'Walk to Library' that helps newcomers to know about various facilities available in the Library. Student-centric teaching-learning methods, namely- Field trips, industry/institute visit, hands-on training, dramatization, literature review, seminar/debate, peer class, model/poster competition, project work, etc. are put in practice. Assignments are given and departmental seminars and field visits are carried out now and then. Our students are encouraged for participatory learning through interactive method and learning by doing. The evaluation system of the college is also transparent and if any student is not satisfied or if any of the students does have grievance regarding evaluation, she/he may approach the Grievance Redressal Cell maintaining proper procedure. If situation demands, remedial classes are held for the slow learners. The institute organizes co-curricular activities like quiz, debates, extempore speech, etc to facilitate the learning process of the students. The institute also organizes teacher's day, Bodofa Upendra Nath Brahma Memorial Day, Independence and Republic day so as to inculcate responsibility, duties and ethical values.

## **Research, Innovations and Extension**

Upendra Nath Brahma College considers research as one of the matters of paramount importance as it is prerequisite to generate new knowledge that improves teaching and learning and contributes to the social development. The college encourages the faculty members to engage themselves in research activities and to take part in National and International Seminars to present papers and to publish the same. During the assessment

period 2017-2022, total numbers of publications contributed by the faculty members are 25 out of which 11 papers are published in ISSN and 14 papers in ISBN. Moreover, till now 5 faculty members (including librarian) have been awarded Ph.D degree. The college encouraged its students to participate in various extension activities undertaken by the NSS. The primary aim of such activities is to instill social responsibility and groom overall personality among the students. Such activities also aimed in arousing consciousness and create awareness on social issues among the students. The Extension Cell through NSS organized awareness programmes in the nearby villages to create awareness regarding cleanliness, health and hygiene, plantation, etc.. These extension activities develop an awareness and knowledge among the students of social realities to have concern for the wellbeing of the community and engage in creative and constructive action for the benefit of the college in particular and the society in general. The college has 1 functional MoU with other institution during the assessment period.

## **Infrastructure and Learning Resources**

The College is situated in a green and eco friendly campus with five different buildings- one three storied RCC building and four Assam type buildings for the academic, administrative and other purposes. The ground floor of the RCC building is used for the purpose of administration, Library and Professors' Common Room while the two other floors are used for the academic activities such as traditional class rooms and ICT enabled class room and for the purpose of the Office of Internal Quality Assurance Cell. One each of the other four Assam type buildings are used for the purpose of academic activities, auditorium, Girls' Common Room and College Canteen. The college has adopted some disabled friendly measures also. The work of construction of another RCC building is in progress. The said building shall be used as the Office of various departments of the college. It needs to be mentioned that the present infrastructure of the college is not sufficient. Of course, the college is going to construct some other RCC buildings with government fund to make the infrastructure sufficient.

As learning resources, the college does have a well-equipped library which is enriched with more than **9826** number of books along with 15 numbers of periodicals at present. The college library also subscribes several journals and 5 (five) numbers of news papers so that both the students and the teachers be able to be in touch with the latest national and international issues. Moreover, the college provides online library facilities and e-resources both to the students and the teachers. The faculties of the college are members of the national Digital Library.

### **Student Support and Progression**

Upendra Nath Brahma College always keeps in mind the interest of the student. The interest of the students is always given priority. The college takes immense care that the students of different categories such as SC/ST/OBC/Minority etc can apply for their scholarships of the Government of India and Assam in time and can receive the same without any problem. The college publishes its prospectus reflecting various policies of the college in the line of support to the students in every academic year. The college has different Cells that work for the wellbeing, development and progress of the students. The Academic Cell looks after the academic activities and tries to maintain a congenial atmosphere so that teaching-learning take place smoothly. The Sport Cell of the college is responsible for coordinating different sports activities within as well as outside the college and endeavours to promote broad base of sports in the college and to inculcate competitive attitude and the feeling of brotherhood among the students. The Literary Cell initiates measures to develop the literary qualities of the students inculcating writing habits and publishing their write ups in the college wall magazines. The Anti Ragging Cell keep watch that no ragging can take place, nor any student is harassed in any form. The Grievance Redressal Cell looks after the students' grievances and redresses the same as soon as possible. The College has a non-registered Alumni Association that maintains coordination between the alumni and the college. The Governing Body of the college monitors all the activities of the college and helps in its well administration so that the college can extend adequate support to the students for their wellbeing and all-round development for the greater interest of the society.

### **Governance, Leadership and Management**

U. N. Brahma College is governed by the Governing Body (GB) which is formed according to the direction and regulations of the Department of Higher Education of the Government of Assam. The G.B. initiates policies and executes developmental activities. The Governing Body of the college is 'The Body' consist of one

President who must be a renowned educationist and should not have political involvement, two government nominees, two university nominees, two teachers' representatives, one guardian representative and one member from the non-teaching staff. The Principal of the college is the ex officio Secretary of the governing body who is entrusted as the administrative head and the monitoring authority of the institution. The college encourages a culture of decentralization and participative management by involving staff members in a number of administrative roles. The organizational hierarchy includes GB, followed by Principal, Administrative staff, IQAC, HODs and faculty members, Librarian and support staff. E-governance measures have been followed in admission & examination form fill up, finance, library services, feedback collection, e-notices, etc. The coordinator of the academic committee is entrusted upon the duty of looking after the academic aspect of the college. The Internal Quality Assurance Cell, with its various sub-cells assists the Principal to achieve the motto and visions and missions of the college. The college has a Students' Union headed by its General Secretary. It also has some other members. The Students' Union also co-operate the principal to manage various activities and programmes. The administrative office staff helps the Principal to run the office smoothly. The Librarian looks after the library and monitors the works of the other members of the Library Staff. The College conducts external financial audits regularly. The IQAC undertakes quality initiatives for quality sustenance and enhancement among all stakeholders. In short, the college is administered and well managed because of the adequate and timely decisions of the Governing Body, bold leadership and administration of the Principal, selfless work of the teaching and non-teaching staffs and enthusiastic support of the students.

### **Institutional Values and Best Practices**

Along with providing class room teaching U. N. Brahma College tries to inculcate the sense of value and ethics among the students. The college tries to create some human values in the mind of the students such as integrity, honesty, love, kindness forgiveness, helping the needy and the poor etc. The college tried to create a 'we feeling' among the students so that they can learn to love their college, their home, their society, their country and above all- the humanity. The Alumni Association of the College has tried their level best to set an example by building up an Orchid Garden which is well known for gynostemium. The garden is open for the society and any one can take its benefits conditionally. The college strongly believes in the doctrine 'Cleanliness is Godliness' and keeps the campus clean and green and inculcates the habit of being clean and keeping clean among all concerned with the college. Initiatives are also taken to make the campus eco friendly and to save energy. The college also adopts some practices in the form of extension activities and services implemented by the NSS and Extension Activities Cell of the college. Among them, a mention may be made of organizing of awareness camp on cleanliness, health and hygiene and plantation.

To maintain green environment, college adopts various conservation techniques, like installation of LED. Environment audit, Energy audit is carried out to assess indicators of conservation. College has framed Environment and Energy Usage Policy to ensure conservation behavior among all stakeholders. College also undertakes environmental awareness programme. The single-use plastic is banned inside the campus. **There are more than 50 different species of herbs/Serbs/ trees are available with almost 70% of greenery.** The college believes in 'Unity in Diversity' among stakeholders and provides an inclusive environment and tries to inculcate communal harmony and tolerance by organizing various cultural programmes from time to time.

##### Response:

Upendra Nath Brahma College is an affiliated college under Bodolod University, Kokrajhar and hence the college follows the syllabus prescribed by the said university. The College has a clear vision to emerge as a centre of excellence in imparting quality and value-based education through effective curriculum planning, delivery, enrichment and feedback system.

**Curriculum Planning and Delivery:** Before the commencement of every academic session, an Academic Committee is formed by the College authority to prepare the action plan and a fruitful design of the academic activities throughout the session. Accordingly, the academic committee with the help of IQAC prepares an Academic Calendar and on the basis of the Academic Calendar of the affiliating university. A general routine is prepared by the Academic Committee of the College and the same is distributed to all the heads of the departments. Each department of the institution, after holding a meeting, prepares schedule of work in the form of departmental time table, division of syllabus and allotment of classes to individual teachers prior to the beginning of every semester. The Academic Calendar clearly reflects the schedule of sessional examinations, end semester examinations, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities that are systematically planned and pre-designed. The same are also reflected in the college prospectus and college website.

The college is dedicated enough towards the effective delivery of the curriculum prescribed by the affiliating university. The Academic Committee strictly monitors the regular held up of classes in the College. The curriculum of the college includes the goals, objectives, courses, process, resources and means of evaluation of all the learning experiences planned for students.

At the beginning of every semester the faculty members prepare Teaching Plans/Lesson Plans for effective delivery of the curriculum. The faculty members of each department also note down time table, actual teaching units taught, academic and administrative responsibilities and extension work in the teacher's Diary and the same is monitored by the concerned HoD's and Principal. All HoD's maintain HoD's diary to record number of classes and number of classes done by the teachers per semester.

In order to deliver the curriculum, different teaching methods like Lecture Method, Discussion Method, Participative Learning, Project Work and Field Work are adopted by the teachers.

Along with traditional classroom teaching aids, audio-visual aids and technology based aids like computer and internet facility are also used while delivering curriculum.

The College organizes seminars/workshops/popular talk from time to time for up-gradation of subject-related knowledge.

<b>Response:</b>
The affiliating university always keeps in mind various cross-cutting issues in its prescribed curriculum. The College, as an affiliating institute has always been conscious of these cross-cutting issues with the view of an all round development of the students and to make them aware of some vital issues like Gender,

Professional Ethics, human Values and Environment and Sustainability.

**Gender Issues:** Gender issues have been incorporated in Assamese Literature, Bodo Literature, Education, Economics, English, Political Science and Commerce. In Assamese, Gender issues have been incorporated in third and fifth semester. The same issues have been included in first, fourth and sixth semester in Bodo while in Education it is in fifth and sixth semester. In Economics some Gender issues are found in fifth semester and in English such issues have been incorporated in third and sixth semester. Some chapters relating Gender issues have been included in Political Science and Commerce also. In short almost in all the subjects Gender issues have been included and the study of the same enables students to develop their knowledge as well as to sensitize them towards the said issues as a member of the society.

**Professional Ethics:** The College always aims to inculcate the sense of Professional Ethics among the students. The faculty members always remind the students during their academic as well as non-academic activities. The affiliating university has also provided the scope of the same in the curriculum. An attempt has been made in Assamese of second semester, Bodo of third semester, fifth semester both in Education and English, in third and fourth semester of Political science, in third semester of philosophy and in first, second, third, fourth and sixth semester of Commerce.

**Human Values:** Human Values are most essential for human society. Human Values related chapters have been included in our curriculum. A reflection of the same is found in Assamese, Bodo, Education, Economics, English, political Science, Philosophy and Commerce in most in all the semesters. We try our level best to inculcate the qualities of human values among the students and to respect the same.

**Environment and Sustainability:** Environment and Sustainable related issues are very widely discussed issues of current time. In order to sensitize the student's community towards Environment and Sustainability related issues our affiliating university has made Environmental Studies as a compulsory subjects in B.A./B.Com second semester in the form of ability Enhancement Compulsory Course (AECC). Moreover some chapters relating to Environment and Sustainability have been included in Bodo, Education, Economics, English, Political Science and Commerce in fifth, fifth, sixth, third, sixth, fourth, second and fifth semester respectively. In order to concretize the knowledge of the students regarding environment, they are assigned Project Work and made to do field visit and practical works. Moreover our faculty members always try their level best to make the students aware of various environment and sustainability related issues and to show respect towards environment.

## 2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

### 2.5.1 Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time- bound and efficient

#### Response:

The students of our college are made known at the beginning of every academic year about the Continuous Internal Evaluation process of our college through prospectus Orientation Programme and Academic Calendar. Our college has separate Examination Committees constituted of faculty members for conducting sessional examination and end Semester examinations. The Sessional Examination Committee conducts and manages the sessional examinations smoothly. Our departments conduct the Sessional Examinations of their respective subjects and papers on time and after evaluating the answer scripts they submit the marks in the prescribed format for submission to the office of the Controller of Examinations of the respective university. Evaluated answer scripts are shown to the students so that they can know their weak points for taking remedial measures. The answer scripts of the Sessional Test are sent to the university if asked for, otherwise they are kept in the custody of the respective department.

Besides Sessional Examinations, we use to give Home Assignments to the students which is also a part of Internal Assessment. Practical sessional examinations are also held in the subject having practical papers. For the smooth conduct of such practical examinations, the department appoints invigilators for assisting the external examiner.

The Internal Assessments are done on basis of the performances of the students in the sessional Tests, Home assignments and percentage of class attendance.

**Separate Examination Wing:** Our College has one separate Examination Wing to look after the examination related works in the College. It is constituted at the beginning of the academic year consisting of the Principal as the Officer-in- Charge, the Vice principal as the Deputy Officer-in- Charge and two Assistant professors as the Assistant Examination-in-charge, four administrative assistants and five grade four employees. It has one separate computer and one printer and one Xerox machine to do all the examination related works smoothly.

**Orientation at Department Level:** We use to provide orientation to the students regarding Internal Assessment at two different levels. At the beginning of each academic session, an Orientation programme is held to give knowledge especially to the newly admitted students and to the create awareness among them.

**Evaluation:**

The faculty members of each department evaluate the answer scripts and assess the student's progress.

On basis of the performance of the students, their progress is assessed and checked.

**Grievance Redressal System:**

The College has a Grievance Redressal cell to look after and redress the grievances of the students. The cell is consisting of the principal of the college as the Chairperson, one senior teacher as the Co-ordinator and three other teachers as members. The cell redresses the grievances of the students with three-tier mechanism for the welfare of the students. Though we have three-tier grievance redressal mechanism but first two of them are limited to college level only while the third level is the upper level i.e. university level. If any student is not satisfied with the response of the first two levels then he/she may approach the university level. If any student approaches the university level even then the first two levels help the aggrieved student to do so. The Grievance Redressal System of the College is time bound and efficient.

The college has decentralized the academic decision in the sense that different departments have freedom to take their own decision regarding admission into major course and other academic activities. They formulate plans and policies for department under the supervision of head of the department. The requirement into implement these plan are mostly fulfilled by principal and G.B accepting the plans as such. If there is any different of views between the management and the department or there is any financial constrains, the principal call a meeting with the faculties and takes proper decision on that particular issue. The library books purchase is requisitioned by librarian and budget is allocated by the principal.

The college is affiliated to Bodoland University and all activities, rules and regulations are done by following rule and regulations of UGC and State Govt. The governing body guides the principal and monitors the college through him.

**The Governing Body:** The College has and effective as well functioning organizational structure and prime administrative authority is the governing body. The body is consist of renowned educationist from the locality, Principal, a few selected staff members, guardian members and affiliating University

representatives. The highest authority is the president of the governing body, who is appointed the director of higher education.

**Principal:** The principal of the college is the key person having executing authority of each and every affair of the institute. He is implementing the directive of the governing body and he is the communicative agent between the governing body, government and university.

**The staff unit:** The unit takes adequate measure in implementation of strategic plan and policy of the college. It offers suggestions in development of the different aspect of the college.

**Committees and cells:** In order to smooth functioning of the administration of the college is supported by a member of the committees and cells like IQAC, planning board, Purchase Committee, Building Committee, NSS advisory committee, library advisory committee, Grievance Redressal Committee, Women cell etc.

**Recruitment:** The initial appointments to the institute were made by the college governing body. Later on the service have been provincialised in 2021 by the government of Assam.

**Promotion:** Teachers get promotions under career advancement scheme as per UGC rules and Regulations. According to the UGC guidelines, Promotion is granted based on the evaluation of API Score.

**Service rules:** The entire employee strictly adheres to the rules and regulations framed GU and finance department, Govt. of Assam. Beside, the employees are bound to follow the instruction framed by university in respect of examinations, evaluations, curriculum revision etc.

**Grievance Redressal Mechanism:** there is a grievance redressal mechanism in the institute led by the principal of the college. The coordinator of the women cell is also involved in the mechanism. The library is granted to all employees to raise their objections before the committee.

The institution has able to secure additional funding from the Central Fund for Girls' Hostel, WPT-BC, State Govt. for Community Hall and MP-LAD Departmental Building.
